When I joined the FPOA in the spring of 1986, I did not imagine that I would be writing this column to you in 2001. This is really an honor to be able to lead the FPOA into the new millennium. I expect 2001 to be a very exciting and challenging year for us, and I am quite excited about some of the activities and astronomical events that will take place this year.

Our first public program will occur on April 14, 2001, and these programs continue on weekends through October. We need volunteers to conduct a program for each of these public program nights and others to run the telescope. A schedule of these dates is provided in this newsletter, and they are posted on the FPOA website.

If anyone does not know, our website address is **www.fpoa.net**. I would personally like to thank Morris Jones for all the hard work he has done to generate our website. We shall also be conducting solar programs during the day on Saturdays. Jack Murphy has volunteered to conduct a solar program on April 14, May 12, June 2, July 14, August 11, Sept. 8, and Oct. 6.

All other public program Saturdays are open to conduct a solar program. I would encourage anyone, who is interested, to consider conducting a solar program as an alternative to doing an evening program. If you wish to sign up early for any of the public programs please call or E-mail me or contact any board member.

Our annual Star-B-Que is on August 18 this year,

which is also my birthday, and this year's FPOA Member Appreciation Night is September 15.

I think it is appropriate to relate a few administrative topics here too. Remember, in order to reserve and use the 30" telescope on non-public program nights, you must be a paid up member, have participated in a public program in 2000 or plan to present one in 2001, and be certified on the telescope. We are working on a new system to keep track of this information and to make reservations for the telescope. At present to reserve the telescope, you will have to call the state park office in San Juan (831-623-4526 or 831-623-4881). You can obtain the gate combination at that time too.

Please note that the gate combination changes at the beginning of each calendar month, and that the gate combination is <u>not</u> for general distribution, since the combination is part of the observatory security. A schedule for telescope certification and state park volunteer training will be issued soon. Please contact any board member for further information.

In closing, 2001 should be a very spectacular year for astronomy. Mars comesto opposition on June 13, and this opposition should be the best since the late 1980's. It will be a great time to observe Mars. Both the Leonids and the Geminids occur at new moon with a partial eclipse of the sun visible from Fremont Peak the day after the Geminids. See you at the peak.

Peak Experiences in Y2K

Last night 9/9/00, Akkana and I did the FPOA public program. We presented a lunar program, with slides of lunar features, and a few constellation and deep sky slides to show what else we'd be looking at that night through the 30 inch Challenger telescope that night. This slide presentation was followed by a lunar sketching activity we've been wanting to try out. We handed out little sketchpads Akkana made and let those who were interested sketch. We had 8 little "clipboards" and many more budding sketchers than materials. We had examples of our own sketches and explained how to start a sketch, and let them go to the telescopes to see what they wanted to sketch. Then they came into the classroom to compare their sketches with our RUKL charts. Or to find out what they were looking at. It was a fun and interesting program.

It was a good mooning night and then we looked at M57 and M13 and Uranus and many of its moons. A few other objects were looked at through 4 refractors out in front. The 40 or so visitors had a great time. So did we.

We did make a discovery last night, however. Just as we were finishing up for the night we looked throught the 20x100 binoculars mounted on the south opening of the observatory. Dave North made the discovery, so I can't take credit for it. He announced "here's Scorpius". Right in between Formalhaut and B Cetus was Scorpius Minimus, the little scorpion asterism. The whole asterism fit in the field of view of the binoculars. Today we pulled up the area on SkyMap Pro, and sure enough, there was our asterism! 103 and 104 Aquarii made up the "pinchers" of the scorpion. 106, 107 and 108 Aquarii made up the thorax area, and TYC 6408 1355-1, 620-1 and 1347-1 made up the tail.

It was a great finish to a fun night!
